MNI Governance	General and admin updates	<p>Changes in MNI Statutes</p> <p>The MNI Extraordinary General Assembly of 17 November 2022 approved some changes to the MNI Statutes in relation to (in summary):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Setting maximum annual membership fee [compliance: required by Belgian Association Code]: the annual membership fee may not exceed the amount of EUR 500,000 ○ Clarify the Powers of the General Assembly [smarter operations]: limit powers to those explicitly conferred to it by law; task with decisions concerning the expulsion of members ○ Composition, Powers and Decision-Making in the Executive Committee [compliance]: delegate all powers not expressly reserved to the General Assembly; option to ask for unanimous decision-making on key topics ○ Define the role and responsibilities of the Executive Director and Secretariat [smarter operations]: clarify role, appointment and reporting ○ Simplifying representation of the Association vis-à-vis third parties and in court: the President as sole signatory (VP as backup); option to be represented by lawyer in court; daily management powers for Exec. Director ○ Defining Conflict of Interest Procedure [compliance: required by Belgian Association Code]: all concerned parties are obligation to disclose the existence or potential existence of a conflict of interest as it arises Once the statutes will be officially signed by the notary and published, it will be available on MNI Website. <p>MNI Project Template for Funding Requests</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● In 2022 MNI adopted a Code of Conduct setting the minimum standards for MNI and its Members, to help avoiding potential conflicts of interest, healthcare fraud and support ethical and transparent interactions with the Healthcare Community.

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		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> To enhance transparency and independence, as from 2022 MNI will provide funds to third parties based on specific criteria and following the submission of a detailed project proposal, including provision of overall objectives, methodology, budget, and KPIs. To ease this process, MNI has developed a template for submission of fundings' request, which is publicly available on MNI website here. All funded projects will be listed publicly on the same page. <p>2022 MNI Annual Report</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The 2022 MNI Annual Report is in progress with the intention to publish it by April 2023.
MNI Strategy & annual plan	Develop an MNI Strategy	<p>Development of an MNI Strategy</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> During 2022, the MNI Working Groups member and the MNI Executive Committee were consulted on the development of the MNI Strategy 2023-2027. The strategy is founded on three main pillars, upon which advocacy, regulatory/legal requirements and communication apply across the board: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Raising the importance of Medical Nutrition (MN) in the care pathway Safeguarding and enhancing patient access of MN in the European Union Ensuring the proper (clinical) use of MN The strategy was approved by the MNI Executive Committee and the final version will be shared with members shortly. <p>Project based approach</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> As from 2023 MNI will work on a project-based approach, instead of Working Groups' based. The MNI Executive Committee approved a provisional plan of projects. MNI members' companies will continue to contribute to the various adopted projects with their expertise and all competent member representatives will be invited to lead and contribute to their implementation. Working Groups will therefore be gradually dissolved and members of WG now being nominated MNI experts, project and task force leaders. A webinar with the WGs members will be on 19 January to go through the new settlement and address any questions.

EPF drafted a 4-page document including what patients selected as "the best" recommendations of the full-length IBD guideline. They are currently re-drafting those into lay language. In parallel, they are looking for a graphic designer who would make the guideline more visual. 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		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Nutrition booklet and campaign / deliverables: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Campaign "The Living Well During Cancer Treatment" with Patients Stories 2021 here ▪ Updated the toolkit materials ▪ Challenge Cancer Intergroup webinar ▪ European survey on nutrition (800 responses from cancer patients around Europe) <p>SNE</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The MNI and SNE Secretariats – together with Xavier Lavigne / Abbot , SNE Board member and MNI RAWG Chair - held regular meetings / catch-up calls to keep each other updated and to follow-up on projects related to FSMPs, namely: Front of Pack task force; 6 ways to recognise an FSMP (based on EU law); Organic Labelling for FSMPs; court cases on FSMPs. • During its last General Assembly in October, SNE adopted a strategy for the period 2023-2024, defining in details goals and an action plan. • MNI contributed to an SNE overview of joint or MNI-only materials on disease-related malnutrition, medical nutrition, FSMPs. <p>ISDI</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • MNI and ISDI finalised a joint factsheet on 6 ways to recognise an FSMP (based on Codex) which is now published on both associations’ website and social media channels. • Following the adoption of a Code on “Responsible Practices for Interactions with Healthcare Professionals”, ISDI published a statement on “Supporting optimal nutrition and ethical interactions with healthcare professionals”. Read more here. • ISDI recently changed its legal seat from the USA to Belgium.

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Public Affairs / PAWG	Position Medical Nutrition and Disease-related Malnutrition higher on the health policy agenda	<p>Europe's Beating Cancer Plan</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • MNI responded to the European Commission's consultation on the European Cancer Inequalities Registry (ECIR). The ECIR aims at tackling inequalities in cancer prevention and care. • MNI not only responded to the official survey but also sent a letter to the European Commission highlighting the issue of cancer-related malnutrition and malnutrition screening, as well as the lack of systematic collection from Member States on the matter. • The Commission replied to MNI letter acknowledging the importance of nutritional care for cancer patients and the lack of comparable data and pointed to two projects launched by the Commission: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ INTERACT-EUROPE - a 18-month project (July 2022 - November 2023) led by the European Cancer League which brings together 33 partners from 17 countries aiming at developing a European inter-specialty cancer training programme, involving all main oncology disciplines and professions, cancer centres and patient groups, based on relevant needs assessments. ○ Network on Integrated Nutrition Cancer Care: This is the network created through ENHA in 2021 under the Health Policy Platform of the Commission. <p>Critical Raw Material</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • MNI responded to the European Commission's consultation on the Critical Raw Materials Act. Main points: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ The consultation mentions the health industries in its introduction, but this should not be limited to medical devices or in-vitro diagnostics, but all components of healthcare: ingredients that are essential to care for people should be included. ○ We recommended the establishment of "strategic reserves" where possible (depending on shelf-life span) of CRMs at EU level to inhibit speculation from international markets and face potential risks of shortages. ○ Ingredients referred to: Sunflower oil; Amino acids; Vitamins and trace elements; but also concerns lie with Hydrolysed Corn Starch; Lecithin; Maltodextrin; Glucose; Hydroxides, Citrates, Phosphates, Carbonates, Chlorides; Whey & Casein Derivatives; Lactose; Milk Powders.

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		<p>Cancer Clinical trials</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Hrishi Kulkarni liaised with and met Matti Aapro, professor in oncology (Switzerland), sharing common views on how to improve clinical nutrition in cancer care and research. • Hrishi's point of view is that for MNI to have an impact, we have to, inter alia, work on medical education in particular through clinical trials (CT), especially for cancer, as there is no lack of funding for cancer drug development, but almost nobody bothers with nutrition. We could reach oncologists by advocating that CT for cancer drugs should include nutrition as an ethical component as per the European Parliament BECA report. • Hrishi and Matti discussed the subject matter and agreed that this could be a project for MNI where Matti could be the project coordinator. • The PAWG and ESPEN WG discussed this ambitious idea and agreed to make contact with Matti Aapro to explore it further. A call with Aapro is now scheduled in February.
Regulatory Affairs / RAWG	Ensure an appropriate Regulatory Environment for Enteral Nutrition	<p>MNI Statement on FSMPs vs General Foods</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The RAWG finalised a document to clarify in detail the differences between categories of foods, in particular between FSMPs and general/fortified foods, within the scope of the EU Regulations. The document is published here. <p>6 ways to recognise an FSMP</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • As an extract to the statement mentioned above, the RAWG worked out a simple factsheet to ease the understanding of the category to the non-specialists of the sector. • The table was further duplicated: one referring to EU FSMPs law and one to global concept of FSMPs under Codex. MNI and SNE jointly intend to share these documents with Basil Mathioudakis – former Head of Unit of the European Commission at DG Health, currently in charge of food inspectors’ training.</p> <p>Organic Labelling for FSMPs Background:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● FSMPs for infants and adults cannot make organic labelling in the EU and MNI and SNE wanted to ensure consistency in the possibility to make organic labelling in the EU for all Foods for Specific Groups categories. ● MNI and SNE had a virtual meeting with the European Commission DG Agri and DG Health in February 2021. The Commission showed interest but had other priorities in 2021 and asked many technical questions. ● Following that meeting the RAWG commissioned a Report to Ecocert to respond to the questions raised by the European Commission. ● Ecorcert provided overall a positive feedback on positioning FSMPs for organic labelling and developed a series of documents:

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		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ A full Report ○ A List of Ingredients for organic labelling ○ A draft Presentation to be used as basis to introduce the topic with the Authorities <p>Global topics</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● The members are working on creating a repository of reference documents that can be shared within the industry and signposted to the national industry groups (NIGs). ● The intention was also to produce a series of papers on the regulatory environment for Medical Nutrition based on EU and CODEX/international requirements. The documents mentioned above in this paragraph are part of these efforts. ● Furthermore, this repository will support education of relevant stakeholders: regulators, policy-makers, administrators, healthcare professionals etc. on FSMPs.
Home Parenteral Nutrition / HPN WG	Raise awareness on the benefits of parenteral nutrition in the ambulatory sector	<p>Funding to Pancreatic Cancer Europe (PCE)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● PCE finalised a booklet and 7 infographics addressing – among other topics related to nutrition - malnutrition, medical nutrition and Home Parenteral Nutrition. ● This material is now used for an awareness campaign on social media to different target audiences to support improving the nutritional status of the pancreatic cancer patient. ● More information here <p>HPN Access Mapping – White Paper</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● The HPW WG – with the support of Mtech - has finalised a White Paper on “Factors contributing to unequal access to home parenteral nutrition in Europe”. The paper concludes that despite the proven benefits of HPN, the extent to which it is used across Europe varies markedly. Reasons for this include: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ The absence of legislative frameworks to support the provision of HPN. ○ Inconsistent enforcement of legislation when such a framework does exist. ○ Mixed acceptance and implementation of HPN clinical guidelines. ○ A lack of reimbursement for the intervention.

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		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The paper adds on with three crucial calls to action: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ HPN clinical guidelines need to be more consistently implemented, further reimbursement for HPN must be provided, and the management, organisation, and delivery of HPN all need to improve. ○ Greater efforts are needed to better educate and inform decision-makers of current evidence and expert opinion in treatment guidelines. Improving adherence with treatment ESPEN guidelines will lead to improved access to HPN among those patients who need it. ○ Action is needed by payers to address setting, indication, and regional reimbursement limitations to improve patient access to HPN. • The paper was recently submitted to the MNI Executive Committee for endorsement, prior to its publication and dissemination.
Market Access Working Group	Ensure that decision-makers and payers are aware of medical nutrition interventions' economic value and provide rapid and sustained access to all appropriate patients who would benefit from these interventions, when and where they need it	<p>Oncology Health-Economic Model</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Mtech circulated the final model specification in November, and the draft model was presented to the MAWG in early December. The final draft was circulated on 23 December and MAWG members are to provide their final comments to Mtech by 20 January 2023. <p>Market access challenge in Portugal</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Further to the issues raised by Mafalda Quelhas earlier in 2022 (implementing medical nutrition policies including the reimbursement of homecare in Portugal), it was agreed to request a 2-hour online meeting in December to discuss the developments in Portugal and to better prepare for an in-person workshop. Due to delay in receiving Mafalda's reply, the call was set for 12 January 2023. <p>EU inflation position paper – timing/info gathering</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The group wishes to publish a position paper on the increasing costs due to inflation in the EU. It was agreed to aim for circulation by end January. NIGs secretariats from FR, UK, BE, DE and NL have been asked to share the position papers they published, which will serve as a basis for MNI's.
